

The Attributes of God – Righteousness

I. Righteousness (definition)

- “Rightwiseness” is a former spelling which more clearly expresses its meaning.
- God is always righteous.
- God’s righteousness causes Him to always think and do what is right or act in perfect goodness in relation to His creation.
- God can’t make a choice that is not right.
- Verses:

III. Righteousness AND Justice (Two Sides of the Same Coin)

- You can’t have righteousness without having justice.
- Verses:

Psalm 9:8

Psalm 33:5

Psalm 36:6

Psalm 48:10

Psalm 89:14

Amos 5:24

- God is just in that He has perfect integrity or moral character. Sin, therefore, cannot be tolerated or go unpunished under His sovereign rule.
- The primary purpose of the punishment of sin is the maintenance of what is right – justice.

IV. How Do We Measure Up To This?

- Is our righteousness something we earn by having perfect obedience to God? (Go to next bullet point.)
- We are neither perfect nor obedient, so we can’t “earn” anything.
- We are completely unrighteous.
- Do we confuse moral behavior, what we might call self-righteousness, with true God-honoring righteousness?
- We are under God’s wrath (Romans 1:18).

V. Righteousness Fulfilled in the Gospel

- Romans 1:16-17 – “**the RIGHTEOUSNESS** of God is **REVEALED**”
- Romans 3:26 -- God sacrificed his OWN perfect son, who deserved no wrath, to satisfy His RIGHTEOUSNESS, if we believe that, then we are saved by faith.
- Romans 4:1-5
- 2 Corinthians 5:21

“No man can put on the robes of Christ’s righteousness till he has taken off his own. Nothing can damn a man but his own righteousness; nothing can save him but the righteousness of Christ.” --Charles Spurgeon
